





## Notes on Completing Your Application

- 1. Plan to complete your application about 1-2 weeks before applications are due. Goal is:
  - Early August (Military)
  - Mid-August (Ophthalmology)
  - Late-August (Plastic Surgery Common Application)
  - Mid-September (ERAS): Use the <u>ERAS Residency Applicant Checklist</u>

#### 2. Be responsive to emails!

- Student Affairs Staff
- Letter Writers
- Program Coordinators and Directors

- 1. Use resources on the Personal Statement webpage
  - Review the three-part <u>Personal Statement video series</u>
  - Draft your Personal Statement using the <u>Personal Statement</u>
     Worksheet
  - Use the <u>Editing Checklist</u>
- 2. Ask 2 physicians in your specialty to review (1 is okay)
- 3. Submit your draft to <u>Career Advising Personal Statement</u>
  Review Service
- 4. Finish editing via your professional and peer networks

#### Personal Statement Worksheet A. Identifying the Foundations of Your Personal Narrative Step 1: Reflect on these questions: What three words would my colleagues, friends, and family use to describe me? What are my strengths and skills? Those that are important to me and valued by this specialty. What interests, life experiences, or accomplishments demonstrate my strengths and skills/or exemplify my values and priorities? What accomplishments in my life make me proud? What obstacles have I encountered and what have I learned from them: Are there extenuating circumstances, challenges, or sensitive issues I may need to address? E.g., academic difficulties, extended time in medical school. Ask your Specialty Career Advisor if this needs to be in your personal statement. What are my professional goals? What is the one thing I want programs know about me? Step 2: Craft your hook: Identify a compelling personal or patient story that makes the committee want to know more. If you choose a patient story or one about another person, it should underscore your own qualities. How did it impact me, my growth, and the way I approach situations?

#### Career Advising Personal Statement Review Service

Upload your PS for review using this Microsoft Form

- Submit no later than July 31st
  - Now-July 10: 3-week turnaround time
  - July 11-20 (closed for submissions)
  - July 21-July 31: 4-week turnaround time
- 1-2 physicians in your specialty needs to review before you submit
- One review per student
- Submission must be 650 words or less. One page only.



## CAS: Application Components

**Central Application Service = CAS in San Francisco Match System** 

#### **Personal Information**

- Contact Info
- Education All medical school, undergraduate, graduate (non-medical), internship, residency, and fellowship history
- Exams/Licenses/Certs
- Employment History
- Publications
- Honors/Interests Add Honors, awards, achievements, other research activities, hobbies and interests

MSPE - will be uploaded into CAS by UWSOM

College (undergraduate) Transcript/s - DO NOT need to be "official transcripts"; copies are okay

Medical School Transcripts – order from UW, uploaded into CAS by UWSOM

**USMLE Transcript** – you upload to CAS

### CAS: Application Components

#### **Personal Statement**

- 500-word autobiographical sketch
- Two 250-word short essays selected from four short essay question prompts
  - These can be customized for individual programs
- Save all three essays as one file; DO NOT create 3 separate files for each essay question. CAS only allows one personal statement document upload for each program you apply to

#### 3 Letters of Recommendation only

**Required Supplemental Form** – included in CAS application; includes career objectives, specialty electives and related activities, public services and activities



## ERAS: Selecting 10 Experiences

- Focus first on your medical school experiences. Work back to pre-medical school experiences.
- From your CV, select:
  - ✓ Substantive, impactful activities, longitudinal experiences
  - ✓ What you have invested time in
  - ✓ Experiences that demonstrate dedication to leadership, service, advocacy, research, or other areas that represent your interests and strengths
  - ✓ What you are passionate about
  - ✓ What you want to talk more about in your interviews (consider what your specialty values)
- Use bullet points/not sentences.
- Quality is more important than quantity.

Consider the overall message of your 10 experiences - Do they give a holistic view of what is most important to you?

#### ERAS: Personal Interests & Hobbies

- No longer a standalone section
- A hobby could be a Selected Experience, but only if it demonstrates significant dedication of time/effort, connection to values
- Be prepared to talk about your personal interests during interviews

## ERAS: 3 Meaningful Experiences

#### Selected Experiences | What made this experience meaningful?

Identify and describe up to three of the 10 experiences that you found the most meaningful.

Reflect on the experience, why it was meaningful, and how it influenced you. Weave in the focus area or key characteristic you tagged. This should not describe what you did in the experience or list a set of skills that you developed or demonstrated during the experience.

## ERAS: Impactful Experiences Essay

Describe any challenges or hardships that influenced your journey to residency. (750-charact. limit)

- Meant to capture information not otherwise described in PS, MSPE bullets, experiences
- Additional opportunity to demonstrate determination and resilience
- Not expected that all will complete this section. If you do, be prepared to talk about the content during interviews. Don't write an essay if not appropriate for you.
- 56% of applicants in 2022 wrote an essay

## ERAS: Impactful Experiences

In 2022, most essays were related to sustained and/or critical experiences that applicants encountered:

#### **Examples:**

- Financial Hardships: Worked to support family growing up
- Life Circumstances: Serious life challenge, illness, passing of a family member, serving as caregiver while working or in school
- Family Background: First generation student, low socio-economic status
- Educational Experiences: Limited access to resources, advisors and mentors
- Community Setting: Food scarcity, housing insecurity, limited access to resources, medical care

### Program Signaling – 2023 AAMC Data

- In all specialties except Ortho, 10% of programs received 20-30% of all signals sent by applicants signals carry different weight across programs
- Sending a program signal resulted in a higher probability of interview invitation for all participating specialties
- Sending a signal did not guarantee an interview invitation
- Signaling had a very variable yield for UWSOM students last cycle

## Program Signaling – Strategy


- Use all signals available to you
- AAMC guideline is to signal home & away programs if you want to interview at these programs
- Visit <u>Application and Program Signaling webpage</u> for more information
- Signal programs where you are competitive/have a reasonable chance of getting an interview <u>AND</u> where your interests and values are aligned with those of the program
- Work with your Specialty Career Advisor/s to identify programs to signal



## Geographic Preferences: Setting Preferences

Offers opportunity to communicate preference or lack of preference for urban, suburban, or rural settings.

- 5 setting options
- Select 1 setting preference
- Text box to describe preference

 If you indicate a preference or lack of preference for setting, your response and corresponding explanation will be shared with all programs to which you apply



## Geographic Preferences: Setting Preferences

Offers opportunity to communicate preference or lack of preference for urban, suburban, or rural settings.

- **URBAN**: The central part of a city; high population density; high density of structure such as houses, buildings, railways; public transportation more readily available for commuting; most jobs are non-agricultural.
- **SUBURBAN**: Smaller urban area around a city; less populated than a city; serves mainly as residential area for city's workforce; mostly residential with single-family homes, stores, and services; more parks and open spaces than a city; limited public transportation and private vehicles needed for commuting.
- **RURAL**: Large amounts of undeveloped land; low population density; open areas of land with few homes or buildings; no public transportation; private vehicles needed for commuting; main industries likely to be agriculture or natural-resource extraction.

#### How Geographic Preferences are Shared with Programs

#### **Division preferences:**

- If you select a particular division, only the programs in that division will see your response. All other programs you apply to outside your preferred divisions will not see information about your geographic preferences.
- If you select "I do not have a division preference," then all programs to which you apply will see your response.
- Don't skip this question! If you do, no information will be provided to any program.

#### **Setting preferences:**

- If you indicate a preference or lack of preference for setting, your preference (or lack of preference) and corresponding explanation will be shared with *all programs to which you apply*.
- If you do not respond to or skip the question, no setting preference information will be shared with any programs.

#### Geographic Preference – 2023 AAMC Data

- Some geographic divisions have more programs than others
- Geographic preferencing resulted in a higher probability of interview invitation for all participating specialties
- Geographic preference impact varied between specialties
- Programs varied widely in how they used preferences; sending a preference did not guarantee an interview invitation

## Geographic Preferencing: Strategy

- Some geo divisions have more residencies than others consider strategy here
- If the programs you are applying to are in more than 3 regions it would make sense to indicate no geographic preference.
- No geographic preference is fine. It is optional to explain why you have no
  preference. If you write a comment, your statement needs to be general enough
  to work for all the states where you are applying.
- If you want to signal a program that is not in one of your geographic divisions, briefly highlight the reason in your Personal Statement.

## ERAS: Applying to Two Specialties

- All programs in both specialties will see the same content for meaningful experiences and geographic preferencing
- Signals will be different for each specialty

#### Example Student Applying in Anesthesiology and IM:

- Completes just 1 ERAS application
- •Both Anesthesiology and IM programs will see the same meaningful experiences/impactful life experience essay
- •Both Anesthesiology and IM programs will see the same geographic & setting preferences
- •Student will have 15 Anesthesiology signals + 7 IM signals
