### WWAMI Provides a High-quality, Cost-effective Medical Education for Idaho Students

*U.S. News & World Report* has ranked the UW School of Medicine No. 1 in primary care for 20 of the past 21 years. The School also has ranked No. 1 in rural medicine and family medicine — rankings held for 24 consecutive years.

### WWAMI is an Enduring Partnership

In 1971, the UW School of Medicine initiated a collaboration with the states of Washington, Alaska, Montana and Idaho to provide access to high-quality and cost-effective public medical education and to meet physician workforce needs across the region. Wyoming joined the collaboration in 1996. The WWAMI program is an internationally recognized model for community-based, decentralized medical education.

Throughout WWAMI's 44-year history, thousands of participants — including physicians and other healthcare providers, universities, medical societies, hospitals and legislators — have partnered and achieved success by sharing resources, expertise and knowledge.



## Idaho Physicians Provide Training Across the State

Idaho WWAMI has 31 required clerkships in 11 communities across the state. More than 90 students completed required and elective rotations at these sites in 2014–2015. A variety of programs, like TRUST (Targeted Rural Underserved Track), provide longitudinal clinical experiences in diverse locations — cities, small towns and rural areas.

Idaho WWAMI established TRUST in 2013. TRUST admits students with a specific interest in rural and underserved care and matches them to rural and underserved communities where they participate in longitudinal curricular activities during all four years of medical school.

## Idaho Residency Programs

One of the strongest predictors of where physicians choose to practice is where they complete residency training. Idaho has an excellent record for training and retaining residents for practice: 54 percent of active physicians who completed graduate medical education in Idaho work in Idaho, a ratio that ranks Idaho No. 9 in the nation for resident retention. The national state median is 44.4 percent.
