# Patient Care Phase Clerkship Options & Considerations





## Patient Care Phase

Begins in spring quarter of the second year of the curriculum and extends through winter quarter of the following academic year.

- During the patient care phase the following required clerkships are taken:
  - Internal Medicine (12 weeks)
  - Family Medicine (6 weeks)
  - Obstetrics and Gynecology (6 weeks)
  - Pediatrics (6 weeks
  - Psychiatry (6 weeks)
  - Surgery (6 weeks)

## Patient Care Phase

Two general types:

- BLOCKED clerkships, all taken sequentially
  - (TRACK, Greater Seattle Option, Safari)
- INTEGRATED clerkships, some sequential and some integrated
  - WWAMI Rural Integrated Training Experience (WRITE)
  - Olympia (Washington) Longitudinal Integrated Clerkship (Olympia LIC)

# General information for EHM Clinical weeks:

- Required 1 credit courses that are 4-days long (Mon Thu, Friday is reserved for travel to next clerkship)
- 2 weeks in Patient Care and 1 week in Explore and Focus
- Distance learning course, <u>an internet connection is required</u>.
- There are synchronous sessions and also requirements that can be completed asynchronously.
- Student need to register for these and will be reminded about this from registration.

## Considerations

- Family logistics young child, single parent, primary support for ill family member
- Other challenges
- Disability accommodations (next slide)

If you have an extenuating circumstance you must apply for the scheduling program that best meets your needs. For example, if you need to spend 24 weeks or more in a specific location (Spokane, Billings, Seattle) apply for a TRACK at that location and document your circumstances.

Depending on the circumstance, your schedule may be adjusted to allow additional time beyond 24 weeks at the TRACK site.

If you are pregnant and feel that you need to be in one location for part or all of your clinical phase, please describe your situation.

- received lower evaluations or grades solely because of race or ethnicity rather than performance
- been denied opportunities for training or rewards based on sexual orientation
- been subjected to offensive remarks/names related to sexual orientation
- received lower evaluations or grades solely because of sexual orientation rather than performance
- been subjected to negative or offensive behavior(s) based on your personal beliefs or personal characteristics other than your gender, racefethnicity, or sexual orientation

Your name and the completion date of the clerkship is never shared.

## EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 31



## HOW IS MY FEEDBACK SHARED?


Names and dates are always removed.

- 1. Your report goes first to Melinda Frank, the Director of the Learning Environment. She will reach out to you to discuss further if needed.
- 2. The concern is then reviewed with a small group of deans from Student Affairs and Curriculum (Dr. Raye Maestas, Dr. Michael Ryan, Dr. Mark Whipple).
- 3. A determination is made about the severity of the concern, which determines the timing and appropriate follow up with the clerkship and faculty.
- 4. A meeting takes place with clerkship directors. Interventions recommended might include giving feedback, remediation, or removal from clinical teaching.
- 5. Concerns are tracked centrally.

# Blocked Clerkship Options- Safari & Track

## • Traditional "safari" program

- Travel in WWAMI region
- 24 weeks outside of the greater Seattle area
- Application not required, default option

## <u>Track programs</u>

- 24 weeks in the Patient Care Phase scheduled at Track site or Track region
- Application required
- Greater Seattle Option is a part of the Track Program

- Does not include Bremerton nor Tacoma.

# Is the Track program for me?

- Collection of traditional clerkships which are done in one community or region.
- Allows student to have a significant part of their year in a certain region.
- This fits if you really want to be in a particular community as opposed to specific clerkships in specific places.
- *Example:* if your number one priority is Family Medicine in Seattle at country doctor then you should apply for the Safari Track.



Note: Student A's WRITE site (20 weeks) includes 6 weeks each Family Medicine, 3 weeks each Pediatrics and Psychiatry, a a 4 -week APC, and 4 weeks of Rural Medicine elective. Student B's WRITE site (22 weeks) includes 6 weeks each of OB GYN and Family Medicine, 3 weeks each of Pediatrics and Psychiatry, and 4-week Rural Medicine elective.


# Olympia LIC...

- Patient Care Phase Clerkships in and around Olympia
  - Block Rotations (22 weeks)
    - Internal Medicine, inpatient
    - Pediatrics, inpatient
    - General Surgery
    - Psychiatry, inpatient
    - OB/GYN
    - Palliative Care
  - Longitudinal blocks (two 11-week blocks)
    - Family Medicine
    - Internal Medicine, outpatient
    - Most of Psychiatry
    - Pediatrics, outpatient
- 44 weeks long
- Live in Olympia

## Housing

- Students provide their own housing at Track sites.
- If students are sent away from Track for a required clerkship, SOM pays for housing.
- WRITE is not a Track, it is a clerkship. SOM provides housing at WRITE site, just as it provides housing at all non-Seattle, non-Track clerkships. Students in the WRITE program provide their own housing for Seattle clerkships.
- Olympia LIC is (in terms of travel and housing policy) equivalent to a Track.
- WWAMI Safari students provide their own housing in Seattle.
