<u>Description of APC experience:</u> The APC clerkship is an 8-credit clinical experience during which the student acts at an advanced level. Some, but not all APC clerkships are sub-internships. APC clerkships may take place in an inpatient and/or outpatient setting. The clinical work may be primary or consultative.

## The primary goals of the APC rotation are for the student to:

- 1. Take primary responsibility for aspects of patient care with appropriate supervision
- 2. Refine core clinical skills
- 3. Improve clinical reasoning and expand medical knowledge
- 4. Work as an integral part of the care team
- 5. Demonstrate independence and an ability to think critically, skills necessary to transition to residency

## **APC** rotation structural requirements:

- 1. The student should work under the direct supervision of one or more attending physicians or senior residents in the manner of a first-year resident in that specialty.
- The rotation should allow the student to become responsible for the care of an appropriate number of patients, which usually will be more than the number of patients a third-year student would follow in that specialty.
- 3. While sub-internships must be full-time four-week experiences, other APC rotations may be longitudinal as long as students complete the number of clinical hours required for an 8-credit clerkship.

The student must have access to regular supervision and feedback while being permitted the opportunity to function somewhat independently as appropriate for their skill level.

<u>Description of sub-internship experience</u>: A subset of APC clerkships are sub-internships (APC-S), in which students function like interns of a particular specialty in preparation for residency. Most sub-internships are primarily inpatient but may be in the outpatient setting. Sub-interns are part of a team or work with attending physicians in a primary rather than consultative role. Criteria to quality as a sub-internship are listed below. Additional criteria for sub-internships are set by individual departments and must be approved by the Explore and Focus Phase Committee.

## Criteria to qualify as a sub-internship:

- 1. The rotation must be principally clinical.
- 2. The rotation must be full-time and at least 4 weeks in length.
- 3. The rotation must either involve the student functioning as part of a team of residents, or alternatively the student must work under the direct supervision of one or more attending physicians in the manner that approximates as closely as possible a first-year resident in that specialty.
- 4. The rotation must allow the student to become responsible for the care of more than one patient at a time, with the opportunity to follow those patients as an intern in that specialty would.
- 5. The student must have access to regular supervision and feedback while being permitted the opportunity to function somewhat independently as appropriate.

The figure below illustrates the relationship between sub-internships (APC-S) and APC courses.

**APC clerkships** 

Advanced Patient Care (APC) clerkships are very active experiences that may take place in an inpatient setting with a primary or consultative team, or in an outpatient setting.

Sub-internships (APC-S) as a sub-group of APCs Sub-interns work on a primary team, inpatient or outpatient, in preparation for internship. They may work as part of a team with residents and fellows or one-on-one with attendings.
