Anti-Discrimination

- <u>Executive Order No. 31 Nondiscrimination and</u> <u>Affirmative Action</u> prohibits discrimination, harassment, and retaliation for reporting concerns.
- Executive Order No. 51 Sexual Violence Elimination Policy affirms the University's commitment to preventing and responding to sexual assault, stalking, and intimate partner violence. EO 51 aligns with federal and state laws, and reinforces that sex- and gender-based harassment are addressed under EO 31.
- Executive Order No. 70 Compliance with the 2020 Department of Education Title IX Regulations outlines UW's obligation to follow federal grievance procedures for formal complaints under Title IX, as defined in 34 CFR 106.30 and 106.45—even when in conflict with local or state laws.

Professionalism & Mistreatment

- **<u>1.4 Student Mistreatment Policy</u>** affirms UWSOM's commitment to a safe, respectful, and inclusive learning environment. Mistreatment of students—whether through humiliation, discrimination, or punitive grading practices—is prohibited.
 - <u>Definition of Mistreatment and Reporting</u> <u>Procedure</u>
- <u>1.5 UW Medicine Policy on Professional</u>
 <u>Conduct</u> outlines UWSOM's commitment to a working and learning environment grounded in the high professional standards.
- <u>1.6 Standards of Conduct and Professional</u> <u>Behavior</u> details expectations for professionalism and explicitly lists expected behaviors that apply to relevant learning and work environments.

Assessment, Exams, and Grades

- <u>8.1 Assessment Policy</u> describes the principles and standards used to assess student performance across courses and clinical experiences.
- **<u>8.2 Narrative Assessment Policy</u>** explains the school's commitment to ensure that students receive narrative feedback/assessment during their training in addition to grades and/or numeric ratings.
- **8.5 Exam Reschedule Policy Clinical Phases** requires students to be present for scheduled exams unless excused for acute illness or emergency, mandates timely completion of a delay attestation form, and outlines timelines and consequences for incomplete or missed exams to ensure academic accountability.
- **<u>8.9 Clerkship Grading Policy</u>** mandates that all clerkships adhere to UW grading policies and AAMC transcript guidelines, with successful completion of required clerkship exams being essential for graduation eligibility.
- **8.13 Clinical Phase Incomplete Grade Policy** allows students facing acute illness or emergencies to petition for additional time to complete clerkship requirements, with strict guidelines and deadlines for resolution, and emphasizes that unapproved or unmet extensions result in a Fail grade.

Academic Grievance and Student Progress

- **<u>8.10 Academic Grievance Appeal Policy</u>** outlines a process for students to challenge grades or evaluative comments they believe are incorrect. Note that the final decisions rest with the Grade Appeal Committee.
- <u>11.2 Student Progress Committee Policies and</u> <u>Operating Guidelines</u> establishes how the SPC monitors student progress, reviews academic or professionalism concerns, and determines outcomes such as remediation, probation, or dismissal through a structured, confidential process ensuring fairness, due process, and support.

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Compliance

- <u>2.1 Technical Standards Policy</u> outlines the essential physical, cognitive, emotional, and communication abilities students must possess to meet academic and professional requirements, with accommodation available through Disability Resources Services if needed.
- **<u>2.2 Compliance Requirements Policy</u>** states that students must meet health, safety, and legal compliance requirements, including but not limited to immunizations, CPR certification, and background checks, to participate fully in the curriculum and clinical experiences.
- <u>2.6 Drug Use and Testing Policy</u> describes expectations for students to abstain from illegal drug use, outlines drug testing requirements when necessary, and details consequences for positive results, including possible academic actions.
- **<u>2.7 Federal Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) Compliance Policy</u> affirms that student educational records are protected under FERPA, ensuring confidentiality and granting students the right to access and request amendments to their records.**

Student Access to Health Care & Duty Hour Policy

- **<u>7.2 Attendance & Absentee Policy Clinical Phases</u> outlines the School's expectation that students prioritize professional responsibility by attending clinical educational activities, while allowing preapproved absences to accommodate academic or personal events.**
- **7.3 Student Access to Anticipated Healthcare Policy** emphasizes UWSOM's commitment to supporting student well-being by ensuring access to anticipated healthcare during clinical phases, while emphasizing the importance of maintaining educational responsibilities and achieving learning objectives.
- **<u>7.6 Student Hours Policy</u>** outlines student's duty hours for both Foundations and Clinical Phases curriculum.

Faculty Supervision

- <u>1.9 Supervision of Medical Students in Clinical Settings</u> outlines supervisor qualifications and prerequisites, delegation of responsibility to students, feedback to students about clinical skills and performance, and student responsibilities related to supervision.
- <u>1.11.2 Student Healthcare and Physician Relationships</u> states that, whenever possible, students should receive medical care from providers who are not involved in their instruction or evaluation. If that is not feasible, the provider must be recused from evaluating the student.
